#### Introduction from the Head of School-Community



#### Dear Parents and Carers,

This has been an incredibly busy week at Holy Trinity. It feels like yesterday since I was with the Year 8's visiting Portsmouth's Historic Dockyards during our first Cultural Capital visit of the year. It was a fantastic day with all of the students exploring HMS Warrior, the world's first iron warship. Some students also visited HMS Victory, Nelson's flagship, whilst others explored the Mary Rose exhibition.

You will be able to read all about last Friday and the various activities all year groups participated in within the pages of this edition.

Monday is always one of our most important community days of the year, the day when the entire school comes together to pay their respects to those throughout our commonwealth who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in wars over the last century and a bit. There are very few schools who bring their entire community together for a full remembrance service, but I am proud to say that Holy Trinity is one of those that does. Indeed, it is such a powerful day that the Diocesan School Improvement Partner, John Gilbert, always choses this day to join us and join in with the act of remembrance. Thank you in particular to those who took an active part in the ceremony around the 'Last Picket'.

Year 11 students are now a week into their first set of Pre-Public Exams. We have been very impressed with how seriously students have been taking this practice experience. It is really important that they learn good habits now as they continue to develop and grow in preparation for the exams they will sit this summer.

We were also delighted to see a record turnout for Year 9 Parents Evening on Monday. The hall was still deep in conversation as we ended the evening; parents, carers and students all keen to discuss with their teachers appropriate next steps as they begin to think about the options process. Mr Hunt and I will talk more about that later on this term. We hope all of our Parent's Evenings will all be as well supported. Year 12 and Year 13 are next up, and this will be held in school on Tuesday 3rd December.

Mrs Merry, our new Head of French is continuing to impact the curriculum. She is now in the process of launching a new App with all language students. The app is called Languagenut and is being uploaded on to all appropriate devices. French teachers will share log in codes with students and explain how they are used during the next few lessons. This app will add a completely new dimension to learning in French and will provide a wealth of resources that can be used both in class and at home.

Finally, thank you to everyone who has contributed to our Children in Need appeal today. Students have been taking part in lots of activities over both break times today, whilst raising money. 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


### 'We Need To Talk To Our Children About Mobile Phones'

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

- Finally, year 7 & 8 drama club will be starting soon ask your drama teacher for more details.



### Cultural Capital Day gets off to a running start!

What happened last Friday? CULTURAL CAPITAL DAY!

Fun activities like archery, teamwork games and much more. The point of the teamwork activities was to show us how to work as a team and communicate with each other, and

so the first activity began...

We started with archery, splitting into two groups and went to take aim two at a time. With one arrow each and a crossbow shared between us, we all had a go, firing our arrows. I was nervous at first but gradually got better. The team I was apart of did really well.

Archery was then followed by a teamwork game, involving Lego and communication. The game needed us to split into two new groups, and we were handed new instructions: we had an equal amount of Lego bricks, all the same shape. One group were given a structure built by the teacher. ### Shakespeare's Globe & Tate Modern

Year 10s CC Day trip to London was a rich educational experience. The day immersed our students in the culture and history of the city through visits to the Globe Theatre and Tate Modern. It was a pleasure to watch them engage with each new experience, gaining insights into both the past and present of the arts.

We started the day at the Globe Theatre with a tour, where students got to see the famous open-air stage up close. Standing in this beautifully recreated Elizabethan space, they learned about the history and architectural details that make the Globe so unique. Our guide explained how the theatre's layout affects performance and how actors and audiences have engaged with each other here for centuries. The students were fascinated, particularly by the idea of performing without the aid of modern sound or lighting - an aspect that made them appreciate the energy and skill required in Shakespeare's time.

After the tour, we moved into one of the Globe's studio spaces for a hands-on workshop cantered on Macbeth, a play that the students will be studying for their GCSE in English Literature. The workshop allowed students to explore the play's themes and language in an interactive way. Guided by a Globe actor, they examined key scenes, practiced lines, and experimented with Shakespeare's language and dramatic gestures. I was given the pleasure of pairing up with a student to run through a part of the script with them and it was wonderful to see them start to understand the text after we acted the scene out! Watching the students perform and engage with Macbeth was inspiring; they brought an impressive enthusiasm to the workshop, diving into the emotional depth of Shakespeare's characters and the intensity of the story.

After our time at the Globe, we walked over to the Tate Modern, where we took a break for lunch on the benches outside. With views of the Millennium Bridge and St. Paul's Cathedral, it was a lovely spot to recharge. However, we soon discovered we weren't alone! A group of pigeons seemed very interested in our packed lunches, and a few students decided to share a snack or two. This led to an amusing feeding frenzy, providing entertainment for the whole group before we headed inside the Tate.

Exploring the Tate Modern, the students encountered a diverse array of modern and contemporary art pieces, from vibrant paintings to immersive installations. The variety of artwork inspired plenty of curiosity and conversation, as each student found something that intrigued or challenged them. One student was intrigued by a display which was dripping with water, something which is clearly unique to the Tate as a museum. Walking through the galleries, I was delighted to see how they questioned and interpreted the pieces, engaging with new concepts and ways of thinking about art.

Our return journey was filled with lively discussions about the day's highlights - from stepping into the world of Macbeth at the Globe to the fascinating artwork at the Tate Modern. This trip gave the students an invaluable opportunity to connect with London's cultural history and its thriving arts scene, leaving them with lasting memories and new perspectives. It was a truly rewarding day, and I look forward to seeing how these experiences will enrich their learning in the future both in their English lessons and other subjects around the school.

## **Conflict resolution**

The sixth form spent their RPE entitlement day considering 'Resolving Conflict'. Engagement was high as they sought to reflect on what causes conflict and strategies they could apply to their own lives. This was done through scenario based discussions, responding to videos of those who found themselves in a range of different types of conflict and reflecting on what prejudicial 'bricks' we might each put up to create a wall between ourselves and others we struggle to live in peace with. Finally there was time given to thinking creatively as to how they could encourage others to think more deeply about resolving conflict in their own lives.

The backdrop to our thinking was the Church of England's 'Difference' Project that encourages all of us to be curious (Be willing to listen to other's stories and seeing the world through their eyes), be present (Be willing to show up and stick around, learning to encounter others with authenticity) and imagine (Be willing to find hope and opportunity in places where we want to see change). This day was such a positive one (cake and chocolate helped!) with students creating some excellent responses, such as the following poem:

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## **Our brand new refectory!**

We are delighted to announce that the new refectory space is now open and fully operational. Capacity has now more than doubled, significantly increasing indoor seating areas for students at break. Just in time for winter!





We have also ordered new furniture which has proved very popular with students.





This includes the addition of new recycling stations for each area so that we can be more sustainable and environmentally friendly. Students have welcomed this introduction. Please note that to avoid litter around the site students are not permitted to take food outside of the refectory.





Student feedback has been really positive so far. In addition to increasing the space for students to eat, we have invested in new tills and a new queuing system to allow more students to purchase food more quickly. Our new catering company has also improved the food offer available to students. We are seeing around 40% more students purchase food in the refectory compared to last year.

**Medication in school**: Paracetamol can be administered for minor aliments during the day. If this is before 12pm, a phone call home will be required to gain verbal parental permission. Please note only one dose is permitted to be administered during the school day. If Ibuprofen is required, a phone call home to gain verbal parental permission will now be required at all times. Antihistamine will no longer be given for Hay fever as per West Sussex County Council regulations, please ensure if your child requires Antihistamine for Hay fever, they are given this before school. If your child needs any other medication, this must be prescribed by a GP, be in its original packaging and include the Patient Information Leaflet and the consent forms completed and returned to First Aid.

### **GUIDANCE FOR PARENTS & CARERS**

YOU MIGHT GET A TUTOR FROM SCHOOL, THE NATIONAL TUTORING PROGRAMME, A GOOGLE SEARCH OR A RECOMMENDATIO BUT ANYONE CAN CALL THEMSELVES A TUTOR, SO HOW CAN YOU KEEP YOUR CHILDREN SAFE WHILE THEY CATCH UP?

#### 1) Select the right tutor

- o Get to know them first ask about qualifications, experience (freelance? umbrella body?) & appre o Take up references and speak to them if you can nces and speak to them if you can
- O Ask to see a DBS (criminal record) check, NB private tutors can only get the basic ck; (don't let a DBS give you a false sense of security though)
- o Find out which platform they will use and its safety features


### 2) Establish clear rules

- o Sessions must always be arranged via you; the tutor should not contact your child directly betw private messages or change communication platform
- o A tutor is not a friend they should behave in a professional way, like a teacher o Sessions must not be recorded without your ap oval
- o Try to be in the room for all sessions, especially for younger children, and certainly the first time
- o Your child should not join a session from a bedroom. If this is unavoidable, pop in frequently, ensure they are fully dressed at all times, point the camera away from beds & personal information, and blur or change the background

### 3) Make sure your child knows

- The rules apply to them and the tut
- o The rules apply to them and the tutor
  o A tutor is a teacher not a friend
  o Neither tutor nor child should share personal information, private messages or phote
  o They must never meet without your approval or communicate on a different platform
  o Who their trusted adults are at home and school
- o They can tell you if they are asked to keep a secret or anything happens or is said that is strange or makes them feel uncomfortable, scared or upset



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# **EDUKID**



### Uganda

In July 2025, we are hoping to take 20 students and 3 teachers out to Uganda in support of the work going on over there through the charity, Edukid. Last year, two of our sixth formers attended this trip and reported it to be a life-changing experience.

The trip is aimed at years 10 and 11 students. It is 10 days in total (exact dates TBC) and comprises of a number of different activities:

- Experiencing school life by visiting a school and helping with lessons and sport
- Experiencing community life
- Sunset safari
- A River cruise down the Nile

Although the trip should cost £2500, we are extremely excited to announce that it will be heavily subsidised following a successful application for a government grant and further subsidisation from Edukid. Depending on their situation, students will benefit from between £800 and £1700 off the total and will have a number of months to pay off the rest. We will also look to fundraise as a group, and, of course, individual fundraising is encouraged.
