

Chocolate for Ukraine

I am sure that we have all been touched over the past few weeks by the news footage coming out of Ukraine. We can often feel helpless in the face of such terrible events, and whilst we may want to do something, it is hard to know exactly what we can do in the face of such a cataclysmic situation. Caleb, one of our Year 7 students, decided he was going to do something to make a difference. This is what he said;

"I had seen some of what is happening in Ukraine on the news and talked to my parents about it. I thought that the people there needed help, so I had the idea of selling chocolate to raise money. I was going to use my pocket money to buy the chocolate to sell, but then my mum contacted Tesco supermarket, and they agreed to give us £400 worth of chocolate for free, which was amazing. I started off by selling the chocolate in our street, then at church and at my football club. Then I asked about selling some at school and Rev Millwood agreed to allow this."



On 17th March 2022, Caleb set up his chocolate stall at break time in school for the first time. He was ably supported by his sister Isabel, and two of our Head Team students, Diya and Alesha. They all worked hard together, encouraging both students and staff to buy themselves a treat and at the same time, help to raise money for humanitarian relief. When added to the money he has already raised at church and at his football club, Caleb has now reached a truly incredible total of approximately £1,800, and with stock still left to sell, he is determined to reach £2000. Every penny of the money raised will be sent via the Red Cross to the Disasters Emergency Committee's appeal which is focusing on providing humanitarian aid and support to the people of Ukraine.

Caleb's example is a powerful one. It shows us that one person can be a force for good and can make a difference. We are hugely proud of Caleb, who has put our school's Core Values of Dignity, Community, Wisdom and Hope into action and

chocolate which he could sell for a £1. I contacted the CEO of Tesco on his behalf to see if they would match Caleb's £50. They kindly came back with the offer of providing all the chocolate he needed, and Caleb was able to collect a large supply to create his chocolate stall.

"He has spent the last couple of weeks taking his stall to his football club (Maidenbower Colts), friends, family, neighbours and to his church and youth group at St Andrews. The stall also went to his old primary school and of course Holy Trinity. Caleb is extremely grateful for the fantastic and generous support that he has received. It is a real blessing to be able to support Ukraine in some way."



STEM Careers with Thales Ambassadors

Year 7 had a careers-focused Culture Capital experience, developing their teamwork, problem solving, communication and creativity skills with STEM Ambassadors from Thales. Activities included building structures, creating circuits, coding ozobots and then developing teamwork and leadership skills using specific Thales careers in engineering.

The STEM Ambassadors shared their job & career experiences with Year 7 students; their focus was on sharing pathways into STEM jobs and the variety of skills used on the job. Students were able to hear about apprenticeships and degree apprenticeships.

The day was a follow-on enrichment experience [Mission to Mars] that Year 7 completed with Thales [remotely] in the Autumn term.









LRC News

World Book Day is one day in the year, highlighting the value of reading throughout the year, not only for education but also for pleasure and mental health.

This term our Year 8 students have been reading the Carnegie Medal winning book, Lark. It's the story of two brothers who get lost in the countryside in worsening weather. We were fortunate to have a visit from the author, Anthony McGowan, on 23rd March, our second Cultural Capital Day this year. Anthony talked about his work, gave a dramatic reading from Pike, another book in the Lark series, and answered many questions from the students, such as

- * Why do you use animals in your books?
- * How old were you when you started writing and why did you start writing?
- * How did you think of the epilogue at the end of the book?
- * Did you expect this book to be successful and popular?
- * Is this a real story?
- * Why did you make 40 years pass at the end? Have you considered including why the mother left?
- * How did you choose the characters' names?

After the visit students reported that the author "was a cool dude!" and that "he was really interesting; he talked about why he had written his books. He said he loved reading and writing at school and that inspired him to be a writer."

We hope Anthony's visit will have inspired a new generation of readers and writers.

The programme of the day was designed to give the Year 10 students a chance to interact with current university students, visit key parts of a university campus and gain a true 'lecture' experience in one of the University of Sussex's lecture halls.

After a morning of exploring and researching apprenticeships, another option for the students' higher education, we arrived at the university.



Year 10 students then split off into groups to enjoy a tour of the campus. Each group of Holy Trinity students had Sussex Student

Ambassador guide them around the campus, showing them the most important features, answering any questions and giving the Year 10s ambition to further their educational horizons! an insight into university life from a current student's perspective. We all then enjoyed lunch Mr. D Puffitt - in true student fashion - by spreading

ourselves over the nearest grassy/ picnic area and enjoying some of the lovely sunshine we were lucky enough to have.

After our lunch break, the Year 10 students were



treated to their first real university lecture, in the University of Sussex's newest lecture theatre. The introductory talk was on "Why University?" delivered from a current student, giving the Year 10s an idea of the benefits and experience they would gain from a university education, not just whilst studying, but long into their futures! We finished off with a "Study Skills" lecture from a member of the university lecturing staff. The Year 10 students were able to offer some insight into their own learning experiences so far and then understand how they can use 'university study skills and tactics' to be successful throughout their GCSEs.



Drama trip to London

On Cultural Capital Day, Year 11 Drama students had the opportunity to make up for a lack of live theatre over the last two years with two productions in one day. We started bright and early on the sunny Southbank with a trip to The Globe for a backstage tour and a 'Romeo and Juliet' workshop with a professional actor. Walking around The Globe, the students discussed who might be present in the audience watching 'Romeo and Juliet' and the social/historical context of Shakespeare's theatre. Susan, our tour quide and workshop leader, helped students to see the development of theatre from Shakespeare's time to their own imminent performances for GCSE Drama. We then moved to the Education building for The Globe Theatre, where students worked through key scenes from Romeo and Juliet. Susan's fantastic guidance gave the students opportunities to develop their performance skills and their understanding of the text.

After the Globe we had a picnic lunch next to the Thames on the Southbank, and then a walking tour past the National Theatre, where our set text, 'DNA', was first performed. We went on to Trafalgar Square and Leicester Square before arriving at the Noel Coward Theatre for our first performance, 'Dear Evan Hansen'. Both moving and funny with incredible music and vocals, we all felt the emotions of this phenomenal musical. The set displayed the creativity present in West End theatre and our students were able to critically identify how the design elements worked to take us to all of the locations of the show.



Next it was dinner time and we had a small amount of time to wander around Covent Garden. Our students behaved impeccably and represented both Holy Trinity School and themselves in an exemplary fashion. Once we had replenished ourselves with food and drinks and a bit of a break, we were ready for our final production of the day, 'The Woman in Black' at the Fortune Theatre. This time the set was drab and apparently lacked the sparkle and lights of 'Dear Evan Hansen'. However, once the lights went down and the acting began, the audience was taken on a ghostly and frightening journey with Arthur Kipps. Whilst this show has been on stage for 30 years it never fails to grab the audience and our students were no exception to this! Once again, they were brilliant at thinking critically about the incredible production elements at work in this performance.

Finally, a group of weary but very happy

students and staff made their way back to Victoria and the train back to Three Bridges. As one of students said "I am so grateful that I had the opportunity to go on this trip. It was educational and fun all in one. If you are a younger student wondering whether to pick GCSE drama I would 10000% recommend it." This sense of gratitude was present throughout the day from staff, thrilled to be sharing a brilliant day with students who conducted themselves in a mature way for the whole trip.

HTS Storm Basketball Academy

Following a busy return to play in the Autumn, HTS Storm Basketball Academy is now reaching the business end of the season, with plenty of silverware to play for.

Our U19 Boys 1st Team continued their campaign by cruising through the ABL regular season, despite a hiccup against Bracknell, to finish 15-1 and secure the ABL Southern Conference title for the second year running. After heading into the playoffs as the 5th seed HTS made light work of CoHENEL in the Sweet 16 before a tough 75-55 loss on the road to Western Conference champions Northolt High at the Elite 8 stage.



Recapping the year, Boys' Head Coach Daniel Hildreth surmised, "Following a challenging year last season for all of our players, we had to change the structure of the programme to prioritise their development. Alongside our competitive non-conference games, in ABL play we went to the only other undefeated team with a depleted team and unfortunately lost by a sizeable margin. In the return fixture we had to win by 18 points or more to secure the league title; with a full squad we won by 41 points, meaning for the second year in a row we were crowned Southern Conference champions.

Moving on to the untimely end to the season, Coach Hildreth commented, "Entering the playoffs we were comfortable winners in our first round game, but we were then drawn to play away at a very strong Northolt team in the Quarter Finals. The game was played under huge controversy, and the feeling that it was taken away from us was more prevalent than the feeling of merely not performing on the



Meanwhile, there's still lots Academy's first to play for in the AoC South East Conference for our Boys' development teams, with a number of postponements meaning a busy few weeks of games to come. The 2nd Team sit in third place with a 4-3 record, while the 3rd Team are in fifth place with a 2-6 record; recently doubling earlier this their win tally with a

victory over Northfleet. Progression in the U17 Men's Dynamik National Cup also sees HTS face Bristol Met in the quarter-final, just two games away from the National Cup finals in Manchester. Boys' Development Coach Barney Blake noted, "The learning and development has continued throughout the season for our 2nd & 3rd teams; we can be so proud of their progress. Seeing our younger students maturing throughout the season has been a joy."



On the Girls Academy side of the programme, HTS remains on top of the AoC Sport London Conference with an 8-1 record, with only a league-deciding fixture remaining to complete their regular season. A four-point win over an undefeated Riverside squad is all that is required to secure the league title. In knockout play, the last 16 was a hurdle too far in the AoC

Sport Knockout Cup as HTS fell to Richard Huish on the road; however, the Storm girls will soon have their chance at redemption when they host Huish in the semi-final of the U19 Women's Dynamik National Cup. Girls' Head Coach Barney Blake commented, "A busy year for the girls has put us in a good position as we enter into the last few weeks of the season. We are one game away from a league title, and one game away from a National Cup final, so it is now time to make our hard work count by getting the results we deserve.'

Turning our attention to the lower school competitions - the Sussex County Cup, Dynamik National Cup and Jr NBA Leagues are all in full flow. The U12 & U13 Girls have got off to tricky starts in the tough London Jr NBA, while the U12 & U13 Boys are in good positions to make the playoffs in the South East Jr NBA with 4-1 and 6-0 records, respectively. On a more local level, HTS continues to show their dominance as a powerhouse programme in Sussex, with a 21-2 record across all age groups in County Cup

competitions. The Basketball silverware of the year was claimed when a combined Year 9 & Year 10 squad brought home the U15 Girls County Cup title with a comfortable 50-4 win over Seaford month.



On the national stage, tough results against old foe Bristol Met Academy meant that the U16 Boys and U14 Girls were knocked out of the Dynamik National Cup at the last 32 and Quarter Final stages, respectively.
