Uniform

Reminder - Arriving to School

You must arrive by no later than **8.40**. At this time, a bell will sound so that you can move to tutor time.

Tutor time starts at 8.45 - you should be in the classroom at this point.

The back gate will be locked at 8.40 when the bell sounds. If you arrive after this time you will have to walk around to the front gate.

The front courts will be locked at 8.45.

As we enter tutor time by 8.45:

We will enter in a quiet and orderly manner, as directed by the tutor. We will be greeted on our way into our tutor room. We will ensure that we are correctly dressed. We will sit in our seat, informed by the seating plan.

At the start of tutor time:

If we are on report, we will give this to our tutor.

We will have our pen(s)/pencil(s), charged iPad, charger, apple pencil and reading book(KS3)on the table ready for **checking***. We will check our first lesson on our outlook calendar.

We will answer the register clearly.

We will be ready to discuss any uniform or equipment issues with our tutor.

We will listen carefully to the notices.

We will take part in **the regulating activity** when directed by the tutor (calming, mindfulness, destressing, focusing).

*Specialised equipment stays in our bag.

During tutor time we are Curious:

We listen well, we seek to understand.

(We will close our iPads unless directed differently)

We engage, we are authentically present during the activity.

We conclude tutor time from 9.05:

We are all authentically present when we pray together. We are peaceful, we are still.

We will tidy our work area, check our uniform, tuck our chairs in and stand ready for **the dismissal**.

We will be dismissed by our tutor table by table or row by row.

Phones may be brought to school, but they must be switched of and out of sight during the school day and when on site.


- If you are seen using your phone and/or accessories, your phone will be confiscated by a member of staff immediately.








The 'Soft' Report

Includes detailed focus on progress and future potential as well as actions for improvement in each subject.



Attendance

All schools in West Sussex use a system called **Bromcom** to record and monitor attendance.

Bromcom has an app for parents called **My Child At School (MCAS)**. This allows you to monitor attendance throughout the school day.









More than half (57%) of pupils who were partially absent in week one became "persistently absent" - missing at least 10% of school, according to government data

"As the new term kicks off, we need schools and parents to double down on the energy, the drive and the relentlessness that's already boosted the life chances of millions of children, to do the same for millions more."





The link between attendance and attainment is very still strong after the pandemic – even when we account for pupils underlying characteristics

Every extra week counts when it comes to attainment - so keep going

Students attending 90% (up to 4 weeks missed) are half as likely to achieve grade 5 in English & Maths as students attending 95% of the time (up to 2 weeks missed).

Punctuality

If you are **more than 5 minutes late** to your lesson you are considered to be truanting, as you are missing a significant amount of your learning.

A 'truancy bell' will sound at 9.15, 10.15, 11.45, 1.15 and 2.15.

If you arrive after this bell you will be set a truancy sanction (50 minute detention).

- This year there will be a 'start moving' bell at 8.40, 11.35 and 1.05. This means you have 5 minutes to get to your lesson on time.
- You will be recorded 'late' if you are considerably later than the majority of your class and/or interrupt teaching due to lateness.
